Girls Softball - \$2,000 for equipment In the fall of 2014 Coaches Scott and Aulani Kaui hosted a softball clinic to introduce the sport to students in hopes of attracting new players. A total of 16 new players and two new assistant coaches were recruited for the 2015 season! The coaches sought support from the Foundation to replace aging equipment and the Foundation answered with a grant of \$2,000. Keep up the good work, Lady Warriors!

Workplace Readiness Program - \$1,100 lost in vandalism The Kapa'a High Foundation was able to help the Workplace Readiness Program with a grant of \$1,100. The money was used to replace yard maintenance equipment that was stolen from the school during the 2014 winter holiday break. Advisor Brandon Fujita thanked the Foundation for the support after the devastating loss. The Workplace Readiness Program is part of Kapa'a High School's plan to have graduating students be ready for life after high school. The students get hands-on experience in basic skills as they participate in an aquaculture project and other activities.

Boys Baseball - \$1,000 equipment Coach Bryan Aiwohi of the boys baseball program made a request to the Foundation for the purchase of field equipment and player gear for the new season. establish a scholarship fund to we will always be proud of our benefit worthy graduates of Kapa'a High School who seek to further their education. An endowment goal of \$125,000 has been determined. With the earnings from the endowed funds, it will ensure that scholarship funds will be available -- in perpetuity -- to assist our alma mater's graduates as they pursue their education and careers. If we raise \$125,000 for this endowment, we will be able to sustain annual scholarships totaling

\$7.500, which will make a substantial difference for the recipients. The second area of fundraising is

for an annual fund. These funds would be used by the school for a variety of items – it could support teachers who don't get the necessary supplies from their normal budgets, it could fund field . trips and explorations to broaden the students' experiences, it could be used for campus projects such as creating a sustainable organic garden, or it could be used for various student activities. For this second category, we would like to raise \$75,000 and we encourage annual donations as well

This year, the Kapa'a High Foundation was able to present a grant of \$3,500 to the Project Grad committee. A large part of this year's grant to Project Grad was made possible by earmarked donations from the Class of 1966 and 1969. Project Grad is an overnight alcohol and drug free graduation party for Seniors held immediately after the graduation ceremony. According to event coordinators Leona McDermott and Kaleo Keliipuleole, the total cost of the event is about \$20,000, mainly to cover cost of the venue, food, entertainment, and transportation. However, with all of the donations and support from the Foundation, alumni, and community, this year the committee was able to reduce the registration fee to \$50 per student. With the lower fee, 98% of the seniors have signed up attend this memorable event.

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Kapa'a High School Foundation awarded \$1350 to the Kapa'a High Special Olympics & Project Unify. Kapa'a High School Foundation awarded \$1350 to the Kapa'a High Chapter of Project Unify. The money will be used to offset cost of printing tee shirts for their "Spread the Word to End the Word" campaign. This campaign is an ongoing effort by Special Olympics and their supporters to raise the awareness of the dehumanizing and hurtful effects of the word "retarded" when used to describe someone with an intellectual disability, and encourage people to pledge never to use the "R" word. Project Unify is an education and sports-based program of Special Olympics created to engage young people to play and work together in a respectful and accepting environment. The Foundation is very proud that Kapa'a High's very own, Chaunci Cummings has been selected to participate in the Special Olympics 2015 World Games as a member of Special Olympics USA. Chaunci will compete in the track and field, 100-meter dash, 4x100 meter relay and shot put events at the World Games which will take place July 25<sup>th</sup> through August 2<sup>nd</sup> in Los Angeles. She will be joining athletes from 170 nations who will compete in 17 sports. The Special Olympics USA Team will feature 304 athletes and 43 Unified Partners. Good Luck Chaunci Cummings!




## 2015 Outstanding Educator of the Year



The Kapa'a High School Foundation awarded two teachers \$1000 each for being chosen Educators of the Year at the annual Welcome Back assembly held on July 28th of this year. Calvin Paleka and Kahele Keawe were recognized for their efforts to make Kapa'a High School a better learning environment. According to Principal Daniel Hamada "their hearts are in the right place in working with other teachers and the students." Mr. Paleka and Mr. Keawe were instrumental in implementing and managing the highly successful Hui Academy or Freshmen Houses - Hui Ikaika and Hui Onipaa, for incoming 9th graders. It is a school within a school concept that provides academic and moral support for new students. Up until 2010, a lot of Freshmen students felt overwhelmed by the academic and social pressures of becoming high school students. Average grades were low and students were failing and dropping out at an alarming rate. The Hui system's goal was to help the young students feel like they "belong" in school. They decided to keep all Freshmen classes in the lower campus and focused on ways to help students make a smooth transition to high school. The teachers would collaborate and share ideas on how to improve the learning experience. They established a curriculum that includes technology (learning how to use Google Drive), push for literacy, leadership, service to community, and college and career planning. Last year's graduating Class of 2015 represents the first group of students that were part of the Hui Academy. The data is impressive. They had a graduation rate of 99% with 71% of the seniors going to college! The success of the program was so impressive that other school administrators from around the State have invited Mr. Paleka and Mr. Keawe to their schools to talk about the Hui concept and how it has made Kapa'a High School a better place.
